PAGOSTINO

Instruments produced in Italy by the EKO company between 1978 and 1982. After 1982, instruments were produced Japan (then later Korea). Instrument production was contracted to the EKO custom shop in Milwaukee, WI. Distuted by PMS Music of New York, NY.

D'Agostino (ex-Gibson/Maestro effects) began his own instrument importing company in 1975. The agostino Corporation of New Jersey began importing acoustic dreadnaughts, then introduced the Italian-built enthmark Series of guitars in 1977. These models featured laminated neck-through designs, two humbuckers a three-per-side headstock. Production then moved to Korea in the early 1980s, although some better dels were built in Japan during the 1990s. Pat, assisted by Steven D'Agostino and Mike Confortti, has always antained a high quality control level and limited quantities (source: Michael Wright, Vintage Guitar Magazine). and quitars are typically priced between \$100 and \$250.

DAIMARU

instruments previously produced in Japan.

maru guitars were distributed in the U.S. by the Daimaru New York Corporation of New York, New York Michael Wright, *Guitar Stories*, Volume One).

DAION

struments previously built in Nagoya, Japan circa late 1970s through the mid-1980s by Terada Guitars. Some guimay also carry the trademark of Joodee or Yamaki. Distributed by MCI, Inc. of Waco, TX.

inally, these Japanese-produced high quality guitars were based on popular U.S. designs in the 1970s, but the designs in the 1980s. The Daion logo was applied to a range of acoustic, semi-hollowbody, and body guitars and basses. Some Daion headstocks also feature a stylized lyre.

COUSTIC: MAPLEWOOD SERIES

Maplewood Series debuted in 1980. The dreadnought-styled MS-100 had a spruce top, maple back/sides/sides/fingerboard, brown dot inlays, sealed tuners, three-on-a-side headstock, and a Natural Blonde finish. The 101 was similar, but featured a hand-rubbed Tan finish. A 12-string configuration with slotted headstock and on-a-side plate tuners was called the MS-100/12. Reliable market prices for these models are not available.

DAISY ROCK

Instruments currently produced overseas. Daisy Rock guitars are distributed by Alfred Publishing.

Daisy Rock was founded by Tish Ciravolo in October, 2000. Tish created Daisy Rock to make guitars that appealed to girls specifically. In a male-dominated rock 'n roll world, guitars that were sculpted to the female just didn't exist. Being the mother of two girls and playing guitar for many years, she was inspired to create this company. Guitars feature slimmer necks for smaller hands, more light-weight and smaller bodies, and they also have visual features appealing towards women. Early in existence, Daisy Rock was a division of Schecter Guitar Research. Daisy Rock has now teamed up with Alfred Publishing, which distributes the line exclusively. Hard shell cases and custom guitars are also available. For more information on Daisy Rock and Alfred Publishing, refer to the website (see Trademark Index).

There are onboard effects yet the guitar can be plugged in to external equipment to be amplified. The body is also very light with only the outline of the body making up the majority of the guitar.

Luthier Yuriy Shishkov was born in 1964 in St. Petersburg. As with many other guitar makers, Shishkov began his career from discovering a big personal attraction to music. After spending 10 years playing guitars that he found unsatisfactory, Yuriy attempted to build his own instrument in 1986. The results amazed everyone who played the instrument, including Yuriy himself! From this initial bit of success, Yuriy gained a reputation as a luthier as well as several orders for guitars.

In 1990, Yuriy moved to Chicago, Illinois. A year later, he secured a job at Washburn International, a major
